Students and Elders Celebrate Chanukah Together

A group of Jewish Senior Life residents and Hillel Community Day School students celebrated Chanukah together Thursday, December 10, at the Jewish Home of Rochester. They played Chanukah games and enjoyed a festive Chanukah meal, but most importantly, the participants gained wisdom from a different generation.

This event is part of a Jewish Senior Life/Hillel Day School Intergenerational Program, which launched in October and was made possible by a grant from the Legacy Heritage Foundation. Ten students are matched with Jewish Home residents to interact through discussion, arts and therapeutic recreation. Through



the program, students are sensitized to the challenges seniors face and learn compassion, responsibility and a duty of care. Seniors shared their wisdom and experiences with students, telling stories of their childhoods and comparing notes with the students about the differences between their respective upbringings.

The same day, The Summit at Brighton, a Jewish Senior Life campus, commemorated America's favorite swooner Frank Sinatra's 100th birthday with a celebration straight out of the 1950s.
